In only a three-year period, Dates went from struggling on the streets of Los Angeles to establishing a thriving construction career. 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PVJOBS Employee of the Year

THOMAS PALAMINO

Thirty-one-year-old Thomas Palamino had childhood aspirations of working in the construction industry. His hopes ultimately materialized when PVJOBS hired him nearly four years ago to work at the Playa Vista development site. As a laborer for Playa Vista contractor California Plastering, Palamino is one of the most solid workers on his construction team.

But since becoming a PVJOBS worker, Palamino has not only helped to construct buildings, he's also reconstructed his life. While growing up in the Los Angeles community of Maywood, Palamino grew up in a close family who lived in one of the area's toughest neighborhoods. Although gang activity was prevalent in the community, Palamino managed to stay away from gangs by playing on a neighborhood football team that his big brother Andy coached. But at age 12, his life took a tragic turn when his older brother suddenly died from a mysterious stomach illness.

Unsure of how to cope with his brother's death, Palamino sought acceptance from local gang members. Over the next decade, Palamino's gang involvement took him down a dark path, spiraling his life out of control and ultimately leading to a prison term.

After his prison release, he realized he wanted to make something right out of his life. His parole counselor persuaded him to study a construction trade by joining a firefighter camp outside of Nevada. Palamino jumped at the offer, and soon enrolled in the camp training program that positioned him to work on two state construction projects.

With his parole behind him and two successful construction projects under his belt, Palamino returned to Los Angeles searching for work, where he learned about PVJOBS. He beat out 15 other job candidates because of his sheer determination to use his skills to excel in a new career.

A successful construction worker, Palamino today feels good about where his life is headed. As he reflects on his life's transition, he says, "Growing up, the gang was my world. But since I've started my career, I now know that there's a much better side of the world."

school computer tutorial and gang prevention program.

As construction activities increase, so does the need for craft employees. Laborers Local #300 needs union members with HazMat certification. Certifications can be obtained through a qualified training agency or by the Laborers' training school after indentureship. PVJOBS periodically hosts meet and greet orientations with various Locals to introduce union leaders to our clients. Since 1999, the overall rate of compliance at Playa Vista is 13.7%, well above the 10% commitment. Beyond Playa Vista, construction activity has begun for Trammel Crow's 2000 Avenue of the Stars. The Los Angeles Community College District's Proposition A and AA bond programs for construction on all nine campuses has also begun, and more than 60 clients have already been placed through the LACCD e7 Jobs Program. These projects will greatly increase our placement potential.

As of March 2005, 939 PVJOBS candidates have gained employment, filling 1,727 positions. Also, 332 candidates have completed a minimum of 500 hours of labor, and 44 candidates have completed more than 3,000 hours. We expect to fill an additional 150 to 200 positions this quarter at Playa Vista and elsewhere. However, many of these positions will be filled from our out-of-work list, per our internal policies, reducing the number of new placement opportunities.

Bear in mind that many candidates listed in the table above are already working. We specifically need candidates to fill positions as sheetmetal workers (with welding experience), flooring laborers and operating engineers. Candidates for these specific trades need to submit an application to the applicable union and pass the union test before they are eligible for referral to work through PVJOBS. ROB DATES

Ever since laborer Rob Dates was hired by PVJOBS nearly three years ago, he's been hot property. Dates started off working for Playa Vista contractor Colich & Sons. But after his assignment ended, a succession of other construction firms hired him to work at their projects, as well. Over the past year, 28-year-old Dates has come full circle by working again for Colich & Sons, which recently gave him one of the highest performance marks that led him to becoming an award recipient of the PVJOBS Employee of the Year.

With each position, Dates has added new skills to his resume – from laying pipelines to operating machinery. He says that his new construction career has given him an opportunity to demonstrate his potential, and he feels like he's now controlling his destiny. Taking control over his life is something that Dates would never again give up.

Born in Kalmuga, Alabama, Dates at age eight moved with his mother and four older sisters to Los Angeles after his parents' separation. Following his graduation from Dorsey High School, Dates worked at his stepfather's tire shop for two years. But after expressing differences with his stepfather, he left the job and took refuge in the streets. A self-described "hustler," Dates began drinking heavily and cut corners to survive. His heavy drinking turned into alcoholism, and he lived on the streets for nearly the next five years.

Realizing his life was moving toward a dead-end, Dates began searching for a new beginning. One day, he ran into a high school friend who told him about PVJOBS, adding that he'd "be a fool" not to take advantage of the job program.

Dates took his advice. Within weeks of signing up with PVJOBS, he was hired as a laborer for Colich & Sons.

Today, married and the father of two young children, Dates feels empowered about his life. He's already a member of the union, and he's becoming a construction trade specialist as his career evolves. He says he owes much of his life turnaround to PVJOBS. Explains Dates, "Before, street life was all I knew. But PVJOBS gave me the opportunity to provide for myself and my family. So now I'm making it happen."
