JAMES KING: The Final Recovery

Pile driver James King rolls up his sleeves each morning to work at his physically demanding job for Foundation Pile Inc. But he says he's up for the challenge. Especially since his job plays a vital role in his successful recovery from a lengthy battle with drugs. "Life today is good," says King, 45. "But it hasn't always been this way."

Raised by a single mother in Tulsa, Oklahoma, King, the third oldest of nine children, grew up quickly when he had to help raise his large clan of siblings. He was forced to grow up even faster when at 16 he learned that his girlfriend was expecting their first child. To help support their new baby daughter, he quit high school, earned his GED and got a job in landscaping.

However, life as he knew it was soon about to change: His mother and younger sister were tragically victims of a shooting in their neighborhood. Although his mother miraculously survived, his sister sadly did not. King took her death particularly hard since they shared the closest bond of all his siblings. Unable to cope with her murder, King embarked on what would ultimately evolve into a 26-year addiction to drugs.

King drove his life into deeper turmoil by turning to theft to support his drug habit, leading to several prison sentences. But his struggles paled to the worst day of his life in 1998: His 15-year-old son, James II, was shot and killed due to gang violence. What made the murder even more senseless was that his son, a good student, never was involved with gangs.

As the next few years ensued, King hit an all time low. He served his third prison sentence, and became homeless after his release in 2003. That was his wake up call. "I looked at my life and I didn't like what I saw," he says. "And I wasn't getting any younger."

He checked into a rehab center, where he met his wife, Alicia, a rehab counselor. After getting clean, a temp agency got him a job as a forklift driver. But when the construction firm learned about his prison history, the company let him go. That's when a friend told him about PVJOBS. A few weeks after attending a PVJOBS orientation, he

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landed a yearlong laborer position with a Playa Vista contractor, American Contractors.

Now a pile driver and union member, King is working on becoming a journeyman while enrolled in a welding apprenticeship program. He attributes his newfound career to three PVJOBS staffers whom he calls his "guardian angels" – Gayle Avant, Jeffrey Henderson and Juan Alvarado – for not only helping him get his first job, but offering him encouragement when he needed it most.

A self-proclaimed minister, King says that God has led him to help others on the road to recovery. "I show people that their failures and bad decisions don't have to become who they are."

LATANYA JONES: The Best Feeling

Latanya Jones may be only one of a handful of female laborers assigned to the Exposition Light Rail project, but you wouldn't know it by how she works. At 46, Jones is perhaps one of the hardest working laborers on her crew, which is why she thinks she's still employed, despite recent layoffs. "My hard work is what's kept me here," she says. "I like going to work everyday knowing that people are depending on me."

Jones credits her mother – a single mom who worked two jobs while raising three children – for modeling a strong work ethic. When as a preteen her family left their small hometown in Florida to settle in Los Angeles, Jones fell in love with Southern California. But she also fell in love with a boyfriend whom she eventually moved in with. She soon became pregnant, and gave birth to their son two weeks before her 17th birthday.

Although the young couple married, they divorced in their early 20s. Lonely and searching for excitement, she began experimenting with cocaine. Soon hooked, Jones lost everything: Her son, her job and her home. She committed armed robbery to pay for drugs, serving four prison sentences for theft over the next two decades. Despite her drug lapse after her final prison release, her parole officer felt like she didn't belong behind bars again. Instead, he gave her a break by enrolling her in a drug recovery program, which kept her clean for the first time in 23 years.

Eager to work, she found a laborer job for a shipping company that later promoted her to an on-site manager. But after the company went bankrupt, she worked odd jobs for the next two years. One day, as she visited the Urban League WorkSource Center, she discovered a PVJOBS flyer. A few months after visiting the job program, PVJOBS referred her to work for FCI Contractors.

While she's still in her first year as a laborer journeyman, Jones already aspires to become a foreman one day. She feels equally inspired about working on a construction project in her own community. "Once it's built, I'm actually going to use the light rail everyday," she says. "Knowing that I'm helping to build this rail line...that's a 'bomb' feeling."
